<p>Oregon & California Timber Funds decreased to counties that used \$ to administer services ... a regional and county change</p> <p>1988 Pacific Non-Profit (PNN) formed as place for housing Cooperating Collection of the Foundation Center and fundraising resource center for region covering Eugene to Redding).</p> <p>1988 PNN organizes First Rogue Valley based Non-Profit Conference where four funders meet non-profit organization staff and volunteers,</p> <p>1989 United Way of Jackson County moved BoardWalk Training (A United Way National program) to PNN to reduce administrative overhead.</p> <p>1992? PNN volunteers organize Rogue Valley Development Professionals concept initiated to address increasing need for development staff support for small organizations.</p> <p>1995-98 Devolution of Welfare System, funding from NAAF to PNN to organize Oregon county based coalitions to support services to people affected, including JCCSC. Portland and north sub contracted to TACS for the effort.</p> <p>1998 SOU Extension program organizes annual Directors' Day Conference and house Cooperating Collection library</p> <p>2002 SO Grant Makers Affinity Group initiated includes UW, operating, family, community and independent foundations serving seven counties.</p> <p>2004 Building a Learning Community, held in Jackson County, fiscal sponsor UW, organizers UW & Gordon Elwood Foundation and container group of nonprofit leaders.</p> <p>2004 Meth Task Force begins</p> <p>2005 UW fiscal sponsor for ongoing BLC workshops</p> <p>2005 SOU ends extension program and support for Cooperating Collection and Annual Non-Profit Conference</p> <p>2007 SOU Foundation organizes Annual Directors' Day Conference with local funder support</p> <p>2009 Directors' Day becomes ONLC with steering committee and sponsors becoming United Way and other funders with some non-profit leaders</p> <p>2009-10 TACS reorganizes into NAO</p>		<p>1980's</p>		<p>1990's</p>		<p>2000's</p>

Migrant Education , Laclinica , Farm Farm Workers, LaClinica, and Sister Yolanda and the Catholic church stepped up to help. This was the beginning of the HIC.</p> <p>Early 90's PNN acts as staff for JCCSC.</p> <p>1997-8 PNN Dissolves</p> <p>1998 RVDP goes away when PNN dissolves, later to re emerge propelled by Community Works, Community Health Center and United Way</p> <p>1998 Carpenter Foundation staff, Sabra Hoffman suggests Jan Sanderson, United Way, serve as secretary and coordinate JCCSC meetings.</p> <p>HTF Coordinates and approves the HUD Continuum of Care Grant for our county</p> <p>2006 ChildSpree, later called KidSpree, holds first event under the auspices of JCCSC</p> <p>2009 2010 HTF Takes on accountability for the county's 10 Year Plan to End Homelessness</p> <p>2009 HTF Holds the first Project Community Connect</p> <p>2011 HIC Takes on Southern Oregon Latino Scholarship Fund</p>
